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

UNVEILING OF MEMORIAL PLAQUE

Following a process which began in discussions between Alan Footman (Old Boys' Union (OBU) Chairman) and Anthony Storr Lister (Staff) during the 1980s, a plaque was unveiled in a simple and dignified ceremony on Friday 10 November 2017. This new plaque, placed to the right of the World War I and II memorials as one them, serves as a permanent memorial to those seven SACS men who lost their lives in conflicts of arms since World War II.

In keeping with the spirit of inclusivity and honouring of service and sacrifice to humankind, there is space on the plaque to commemorate other people intimately connected with SACS who have given their lives in service to their fellows. This is done to promote inclusivity and to take account of the fact that there may be people who have made the supreme sacrifice of whom we are not aware at present or who may do so in the future. It is conceivable, for example, that an Old Boy might die in service as a volunteer fire-fighter. We now have the capacity to honour such and it is right that we do.



The plaque was unveiled by Alan Footman immediately before the OBU Tie Ceremony and the day before Remembrance Day - highly fitting timing. As Anthony Storr Lister explained in his address explaining the process and thinking behind the installation of the plaque, every part of the SACS family was represented: High School boys, staff, parents and SChool Governing Body (SGB); Junior School boys, staff, parents and SGB, as well as the Old Boys' Union, thus cementing the growing rapprochement between the parts of the SACS family.

Mr Storr Lister used the opportunity to announce that, from 2018 on, the wreath to be laid at the new Memorial will be laid by the Junior School Guardians of the Banner who will join a representative of the OBU and the High School Head Prefect in this duty, further emphasizing the idea of the whole SACS family. The Old Boys' Union is to be thanked for funding the manufacture of the plaque.

2018 MATRIC EXAMINATIONS

As from January 2018, it will be compulsory for a learner registering to write the National Senior Certificate (NSC) examinations to produce a valid identification document. Failure to produce these will result in learners not being registered for the 2018 NSC examinations.

South African citizens must produce a South African Identity Document (ID) or Smart ID Card. Immigrants (non-South African citizens) must produce a passport and a valid study permit. Asylum seekers must produce the relevant documents from the Department of Home Affairs with a study permit.

The Western Cape Education Department has asked us to inform all current Grade 11 learners of this so that those who do not possess the required official documents can obtain same in the next few months.
